


Why balance chords?


- Pythagorean tuning
 - High on 2, 3, 6, 7
- How do you know what you're singing?
 - Barbershoppers tune vertically and horizontally
 - Vertically: Tune to the specific chord you are singing
 - Horizontally: Tune in relationship to the key note


Horizontal Tuning

- 1. Everyone sings their line on the key note
 - a. Listen for synchronization, consistency of sound/energized vocal line, resonance
- One person sings their part against the key note (sung by the remainder of singers)
 - a. Listen for all of the above (from all singers) plus Pythagorean tuning by the vocalist who is on their part
- 3. Switch off until everyone sings their part against the tonal center
- 4. Everyone sings on their own part
- ★ Important: one person should sit out, listen, and coach the group. Take turns being the listener so everyone gets coached and has a chance to develop their ear
- ★ Faster than vertical tuning and effective technique to tune phrases/songs. If a chord still isn't tuning, use vertical tuning














